I apologize for not returning your March 14<sup>th</sup> letter sooner. A combination of Holy Week, Easter, a House of Bishops meeting and family vacation have distracted me all too well from my workload.

I have read the briefing book prepared by Third Church's representatives setting out the pertinent background and legal rationale for the proposed amendment put forward by Councilman Jack Evans. I strongly support City Council Bill 17-664 as a legislative amendment to the Historic Preservation law retroactively bringing the local law into compliance with federal statutes. I understand that this will address the immediate problem presented to Third Church by removing the landmark designation and will also provide the opportunity for other religious institutions to object to such designation in the future on the grounds of "substantial burden on religious exercise."

I fully support the work of the downtown cluster of congregations and the Catholic Archdiocese Diocese of Washington in moving this forward. Likewise, Councilman Evans is a personal friend and I would be happy to do what I can to support his efforts in this. Please let me know how I can assist.
